

HARM REDUCTION

A SET OF PRACTICAL, PUBLIC HEALTH STRATEGIES
DESIGNED TO REDUCE THE NEGATIVE CONSEQUENCES OF
DRUG USE AND PROMOTE HEALTHY INDIVIDUAL LIFESTYLE
AND COMMUNITIES

History of SSP

TACOMA, WA 1988

- Founder Dave Purchase
- Response to HIV epidemic
- First Legal SSP in 1988
- Point Defiance AIDS Project and NASEN

WHY?



PREVENT DISEASE

- 8,000 HIV Infections Per Year
- 15,000 new Hep C Infections Per Year
- Reduce Needle-Stick Injuries

• 1 in 10 HIV Diagnoses Are
Among People Who Inject
Drugs (PWID).



- Linkage to Drug Treatment


Individuals Served


POSITIVE HEPATITIS C SCREENINGS




2018 NALOXONE OVERDOSE REVERSALS





Program Funding

Program Budget

DEPARTMENT OF ECOLOGY (DOE)

Solid Waste Grant - \$ 4,800 per year

STATE PUBLIC HEALTH FUND

Covers Costs Greater Than Grant Provided Funds

WA STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH (DOH)

DOH State HIV Prevention:

- Salaries/Benefits \$56,000
- Supplies \$24,000
- Microgrant \$ 14,600

Partnership with Department of Ecology

LOCAL SOLID WASTE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

- Enforcement of Solid Waste Rules and Regulations
- Increase Compliance with Proper Handling and Disposal Practices
- Increasing Awareness on Proper Disposal
 Through Education and Outreach

COST EFFECTIVENESS



Estimated Average Cost of Lifetime HIV Treatment is \$379,000.



HEPATITIS C AND INJECTION DRUG USE

Injection Drug Use Accounts for 68% of Current Hepatitis C Infections in the U.S.



HEPATITIS C COST

Annually, Hepatitis C Treatment Costs \$35,000 to \$56,000 Per Person.
